School scores show little change

North Central High and Plaisance Elementary showed slight improvement in the state's school performance scores, and the St. Landry school district dropped a fraction.

North Central had a score of 65.9, up from 65.8 a year ago. Plaisance graded 66.7, up from 65.5. The overall St. Landry system graded 72.1, which is down from 72.9 in 2024.

"We acknowledge there is still work to be done to ensure every single student in the St. Landry Parish School District reaches their full potential," superintendent Milton Batiste III said.

Fire protection millage passed

A 10.36-mill tax for Fire Protection District 3 passed easily in light voting November 15. The vote to renew the 10-year tax was 91% for and 9% against both parishwide and in Washington.

Auditors give Washington good marks

Auditors found that the town's financial situation and procedures are continuing to improve. They suggested two changes in the accounting system, both relating to problems common to small towns with limited resources,

The two "financial findings" by the Kolder, Slaven CPA firm show improvements in the way the town handles its finances. The last audit had nine such findings.

The auditors said accounting guidelines call for financial duties to be more widely spread, but noted Washington "does not have a sufficient number of staff ... to provide segregation of accounting and financial duties." Fixing that problem would require hiring more staff, which the town found would not be cost effective.

The audit also called for improvements in the way transactions are recorded and financial statements are prepared, which would require outsourcing those functions to a CPA firm. The town may do that.

Utility bills will look different

The town will move to a new billing system in the next several months. Utility bills will change from a post card to a full sheet bill enclosed in an envelope.

"The new system will allow more functions for the customers to selfservice their accounts, including logging on to pay their bill and view account history and usage," according to town clerk Halli Polotzola.

Captain sailed South Seas before Bayou Courtableau

William Henry Mayo had a colorful past that would have made his days on Bayou Courtableau pretty humdrum if his steamboats hadn't regularly met with misfortune. He was "a seafaring man in his younger days," according to biographer William Henry Perrin. He was just six years old when he went to sea as a cabin boy. By the time he was 18, he had advanced to first mate on a whaling ship. When the captain of the vessel died, "he was appointed to fill the position, and conducted the vessel back to Connecticut from

The biographer says "he lost several boats in the rivers and bayous of Louisiana," and that one of them was" blown up."

Looking Back

Mayo, who was born in 1799 in Connecticut, came to Louisiana in 1828 and, according to the *St. Landry Clarion*, "engaged in steamboating on the Atchafalaya River and Bayou Courtableau" until his death in 1849.

Captain Mayo married Eliza Smith in 1833 in Louisiana and they made their home in the white house that still stands on the corner of Main and Vine streets. "The entire block within Hill, Washington, Vine, and Main streets belonged to an old widow lady known to nearly everyone as 'Grandma Mayo,'" according to diarist David Jasper McNicolls. "At the time, the only other building on the block was a large stable at Hill and Washington streets."

Perrin was born a quarter-century after Captain Mayo's death but judged from their property and "Grandma's" reputation that "the Mayos must have been important people in the history of Washington."
